

(7) The unit supply will dispose of all obsolete or damaged uniform items in accordance with established disposal procedures.

b. Lost items will be replaced by the Soldier.

14–17. Active Guard Reserve and Active Component Soldiers assigned to troop program units

a. Upon arrival of Active Guard Reserve (AGR) or active duty Soldiers to a USAR troop program unit (TPU) for permanent duty, the commander will direct an inspection and inventory of all personal clothing. Shortages of initial issue items will be requested within 15 days of assignment (see para 14–19c). Missing clothing items, other than initial issue shortages, will be replaced at the Soldier's expense within 30 days of assignment.

b. At the commander's discretion, corporals through sergeants major may furnish a statement, as shown in table 1-2, certifying they have all required clothing in accordance with CTA 50–900, and that all items meet the appearance standards of AR 670–1.

c. Enlisted AGR Soldiers begin accruing the CRA and are not authorized issue-in-kind replacement of personal clothing once they have completed six months (180 days) of their active duty tour and are receiving a CRA. Active duty or AGR Soldiers receiving a CRA must purchase replacement and new issue items of personal clothing.

14–18. Unauthorized alterations

Commanders will not permit unauthorized alterations to personal clothing. Authorized alterations are identified in tables 13–1 and 13–2. Replacement for items that have undergone unauthorized alterations, such as form fitting, pegging, or tapering will be replaced at the Soldier's expense.

14–19. Authorized alterations

USAR enlisted Soldiers in remote sites are authorized local alterations and will be reimbursed for the following alterations:

a. Alterations on uniforms issued from the CCDF will be completed locally using the Government purchase card.

b. Alterations on uniforms purchased at AMCS:

(1) The U.S. Army Soldier and Biological Chemical Command will request funds in the budget to cover the cost of DLA–TS ASUs alteration purchased at AMCS for USAR enlisted Soldiers in remote sites.

(2) Commanders will ensure enlisted Soldiers are measured and the measurements are annotated on the Soldier's DA Form 3078 and the form is sent to the Exchange.

c. USAR procedures for alteration of DLA–TS ASUs for USAR enlisted Soldiers in remote AMCS sites are as follows:

(1) AMCS prepares an alteration slip for each DA Form 3078 that includes the Soldier's name on each alteration slip. Alteration slips must be processed within 90 days.

(2) Commanders will send alteration slips to AMCS for reimbursement, as required.

(3) The AMCS will forward checks to the unit in each Soldier's name in an amount up to the authorized cost of alteration in paragraph 14–20c(2).

d. USAR local alterations at government expense or for reimbursement are limited to the following alterations:

(1) Coat sleeve hemming, cost \$14.00.

(2) Trouser hemming, cost \$8.00.

(3) Slack hemming, cost \$8.00.

(4) Skirt hemming, cost 10.75.

(5) Waist alteration, \$9.50.

(6) Seat alteration, \$9.50.

(7) Any additional alterations required to make the uniform fit in accordance with AR 670–1, cost to be determined.

14–20. Clothing for Soldiers enrolled in the Reserve Officers' Training Corps Simultaneous Membership Program

a. Soldiers enrolled as officer trainees under the ROTC Simultaneous Membership Program according to AR 601–210 will be issued their personal and OCIE initial clothing allowances listed in CTA 50–900 in the same manner as other USAR Soldiers.

b. If personal clothing or OCIE issued to ROTC Simultaneous Membership Program Soldiers becomes lost, damaged, or destroyed, the USAR unit to which the ROTC Simultaneous Membership Program trainee is assigned will submit the appropriate adjustment document (DD Form 200 when an investigation is required), or DD Form 362 when liability is admitted, as required by this regulation and AR 735–5, through command channels to the appointing or approving authorities.
