The U.S. Army Contracting Command Office of Small Business Programs is committed to helping those who have served and sacrificed and looking to conduct business with the government. We provide support to service-disabled veteran-owned small businesses through a variety of methods including acquisition forecast plans, individual small business counseling sessions, workshops, roundtable sessions, expos and trade fairs. Dedicated small business specialists are located at every installation in the United States and offer counseling on a multitude of topics to include: information on the government contracting process; the relationship between the SDVOSB program and other Small Business Administration programs; acquisitions directly related to the mission of the installation; and subcontracting opportunities.

The U.S. government, by statute, has a goal of not less than three percent of the total value of all prime contract and subcontract awards for participation by small business concerns owned and controlled by service-disabled veterans.

Federal regulations specifically state that a contracting officer may set aside acquisitions exceeding the micro-purchase threshold if it can be reasonably expected that offers will be received from two or more service-disabled veteran-owned small business concerns and award will be made at a fair market price. If the contracting officer receives only one acceptable offer from a service-disabled veteran-owned small business concern in response to a set-aside, the contracting officer should make an award to that business.

Definitions:

Veteran—A person who served in the active military and was discharged or released under conditions other than dishonorable (Title 38, U.S.C.)

Service-Disabled Veteran—A veteran with a disability that is service-connected. The disability was incurred or aggravated in the line of duty (Title 38, U.S.C.).

Service-Disabled Veteran-Owned Small Business Concern—A small business concern where at least 51 percent is owned by one or more service-disabled veterans or, in the case of any publicly-owned business, at least 51 percent of the stock is owned by one or more service-disabled veterans and the management and daily operations are controlled by one or more service-disabled veterans or, in the case of a veteran with permanent and severe disability, the spouse or permanent caregiver of such veteran. (FAR 52.219-1(c))

Program Eligibility:

Veteran—

1. Served on active duty and other than dishonorable discharge; or
2. Reservist or National Guard who was activated to federal duty, including those individuals called up for homeland defense; or
3. Reservist or National Guard who was injured while in training status

Service-Disabled Veteran—Anyone who has a disability rating letter issued by the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA). The disability was incurred or aggravated in the line of duty (Title 38, U.S.C.). Legislation does not establish a minimum percentage rating.

Service-Disabled Veteran-Owned Small Business—51 percent owned and controlled by one or more veterans with service-disability rating letter from the VA or, in the case of a veteran with permanent and severe disability, the daily operations and management are performed by the spouse or permanent caregiver.
